




## I think that the overall quality of the written assignments was:



## I think that the overall quality of the readings was:





# I think that the overall quality of the precepts was:




## **Course Questions - Frequency Analysis**


## Class year




## Primary reason for taking this course

#### Comments

The instructor was very clear on all the assignments and expectations.

It was hard to prepare for exams because there was not enough guidance given on what the expectations were. There were no papers, instead there were eight memos. The first one was brutal because there was little guidance on what was expected but every memo after was easy to prepare because I kind of had an idea of what was required.

The weekly case memos were actually pretty fun to write and ensured that I did the readings each week. I think I might have preferred a regular paper to the AP–style timed essays we had for the midterm and will have for the final.

#### Tedious

I really liked the idea of writing a memorandum. It was a good challenge and and an exercise that taught me how to become a more concise and persuasive writer and build skill on identifying important information.

I sometimes felt that I did not understand exactly what the purpose of the case memos were. I feel like I came to understand them better by the end. I do think it would be particularly helpful to include an example of a well done case memo with the first assignment in order to reduce confusion.

The instructors were great and very straight forward about what they wanted from us. The papers were simple yet very helpful to engaged us with the weekly topics and were not overwhelming at all.

Both my preceptor and professor were incredibly helpful.

The midterm was interesting and not too difficult for those who had studied their notes. It was just maybe a bit hard to write two essays in 50 minutes. The weekly responses were interesting and encouraged the students to read their case studies every week, but it took a lot of time to write a paper every week I think that a lot people had pretty bad grades. The presentations were very interesting to do.

Weekly memos were not an overly stressful assignment, and they were very helpful in tying in concepts from the lectures and precepts.

#### Excellent

We were guided very efficiently through the understanding of economic history.

I felt prepared for memos and exams. Any feedback I received from my preceptor was super helpful.

The weekly memos were helpful in enforcing some of the common threads in the course not covered in lecture. They helped with background info/ key concepts that were useful on the exams.

I got better at the written work with practice and further instruction.

The papers were fun to attempt as the case studies gave detailed examples of topics Adelman wanted to focus on. However, for the weekly memos we were never given an example (despite asking multiple times) of what they should look like, which made it difficult to understand what it was he wanted us to do. His comments were often generic and required reading tea leaves to know what to do the next time.

#### Comments

The readings were very interesting and coordinated with the lectures well.

The readings were good, a little long, but they were fair and touched on the themes quite nicely.

They were all very interesting, but there were a couple weeks where the case studies did not really mesh with the lectures which was a little disappointing.

The reading list was great and I enjoyed every single read and read it in my free time. I especially enjoyed the readings on television and radio, globotics, and the great critiques of Keynes, Marx, Hayek and Smith.

I enjoyed the readings a lot. They were easy to read and we discussed them weekly in class so nothing was done without benefit. The slides were the weakest point, since they tended to lack context when trying to look back on the topics.

The most fair and engaging readings I have had for any class so far!

The case studies were interesting and encouraged the students to engage with primary sources. It was not too long compared to other classes. The Powerpoint was helpful but I would have preferred to have the Powerpoint before the lecture.
