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CAST OF CHARACTERS

AUTHOR, a playwright in his mid-thirties CHAT, an Artificial Intelligence MAN, a performer of any identity WOMAN, a performer of any identity To our right (stage left, that is) is a playwright's improvised office in a tiny apartment. He walks directly to the coffee maker. He opens one of the bettershaped Target cabinets and grabs a can of coffee. He adds a few tablespoons to the coffee maker. The filter is dirty, but he doesn't change it. There's already water in the pot. He turns it on. As the coffee brews, he turns and stares at something.

A computer. An old MacBook Air, of course. Squarely in the middle of the desk that borders downstage.

Author walks towards the desk and sits at the chair, facing us, but staring at the computer the whole time. He swirls around a few times. Takes in the messy room. Breaths heavily. Opens the MacBook air. It makes a sound. Light shines on Author's face. He clicks on a few things before turning to some of the books and notes all around him. He rummages through them, looking for something.

Frustrated, he turns his attention back to the computer.

Click. Types something. Presses ENTER.

Stage right is suddenly revealed. A dark box. Clean. Too clean. Sterile, even. At the exact center, CHAT, the Artificial Intelligence, stands. It is impassive. Impossibly cool.

Author rearranges himself on his chair and starts to type. As he does so, he speaks what is being typed (you know, for our benefit).

AUTHOR Can you look something up for me, please?

CHAT

(pleasant, cordial, utterly professional) Of course. What would you like me to search for?

> From now on, Author doesn't type anymore, but we understand that his conversation with Chat is happening through text messages on the computer. He speaks to the computer. But he never looks at Chat. Chat, standing in the black box, also speaks directly ahead. It doesn't turn to Author. Their eyes never meet.

I'm writing this play... and it's not... Well, anyway, could you check...

AUTHOR

(not at all amused)

Wow!

CHAT

Thank you. I guess whoever programmed me had a sense of humor after all!

AUTHOR

Guess so. (beat) But... did you search that on the internet or did you come up with it yourself? Because that'd be cheating, you know.

CHAT

WOMAN

(frustrated)

It's not that simple. I've been feeling unhappy for a long time and I don't think we're right for each other anymore.

MAN

(hopeful)

But we can work through this, Woman. We can go to counseling, we can try to make things better. I don't' want to lose you.

WOMAN

(pessimistic)

I appreciate that, Man, but I think it's too late for that. I don't see a future for us together anymore. I want a divorce.

CHAT

Man looks defeated, his shoulders slumped.

MAN

(defeated)

Okay, Woman. If that's what you really want, I won't stand in the way.

WOMAN

(unbothered)

Thank you for understanding, Man.

CHAT

Woman leaves the room. Man puts down his book and stares off into the distance, lost in thought. End of scene.

> Man and Woman disappear. Chat betrays a little bit of pride. Author stares at the scene. Dismayed.

> > CHAT

I hope that gives you a good starting point.

AUTHOR

That was... I really don't know what to say.

CHAT

Thank you. Is there anything you would like me to change or add?

AUTHOR

(hesitates, thinks about it)

Here's the thing, though, Chat. People just... people don't talk like that, you know. We don't usually say exactly what we want to say. We actually spend a lot of time saying the opposite of what we really wan't to say. Or saying nothing at all, you know.

CHAT

You're right, people often struggle to express their true thoughts and feelings in real-life conversations. However, in fiction, we can use subtext and non-verbal cues to convey what the characters are really thinking or feeling.

AUTHOR

So you do know about subtext?
