1. Is it a ribbon? Dental floss? A demented tapeworm? Lord mayor Clover Moore unveiled plans for a cloud arch that will hover like a deranged paperclip over Sydney. The \$9 million art initiative also boasts several bronzed sparrows and a giant milk crate (milk not included). "Ten years from now, we'll have people marrying by the crate, they'll be making love in the arch," crowed the Committee for Sydney, in breach of OH&S regulations.
