A LETTER FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR & YOUTH BOARD CHAIR

Dear beloved community,

As JYCA celebrates 25 years of cultivating the leadership of young progressive Jews, we invite you to pause with us to look back at our history. An essential part of youth empowerment is honoring the people and work that came before us, making it possible for us to be where we are today.

You'll notice rivers running throughout this book. We draw inspiration from the first section of the Torah in which the four headwaters of Eden are described. We chose rivers to honor the source of our magic and its continuity. In 1995, the founders envisioned a Jewish youth community grounded in deep care, with adults committed to youth empowerment and joy. They connected Jewishness to justice, and built a youth space where justice is Jewish. The values of JYCA's founding youth and staff have been carried through the years

to guide the culture and work of our organization. Over the past 25 years, JYCA's river has changed course, sped up, gone through times of flood and times of drought. Through the twists and turns, the same magic our founders dreamt up continues to run throughout our organization.

We see JYCA's four headwaters as youth empowerment, socio-political education, Jewish ritual, and action. These aspects of our work are all imbued with the magic of radical inclusivity, deep compassion, democratic process and youthfulness. Just like the four headwaters flow in different directions, JYCA's impact flows through the varied work and lives of our alumni, community partners, the staff who have shaped our organization and the families who have supported their kids and the community.

Thank you to all who've kept JYCA's river flowing. We are so proud of the community we've created, the impact we've had on generations of Jewish youth, the campaigns we've supported, and the wins we've achieved over the last quarter of a century. Thank you for celebrating 25 years of JYCA and envisioning where our river will take us in the next 25 years.

BEING HERE FOR JEWISH YOUTH, FROM THE BEGINNING

A LETTER FROM JYCA'S FOUNDER

Dear JYCA Community,

When I was in high school, I was in despair about the state of the world. I desperately wanted to help make meaningful change, but I didn't know how. I was also ashamed of my Jewishness, trying to hide my identity in the public high school that I attended, which was not a tolerant or welcoming place for those who deviated in any way from the dominant culture.

When I started to dream up JYCA, inspired by my work with Aurora Levins Morales and Yonah Camacho Diamond, my goal was to create the program I wish I had in high school. I wanted a place where each unique individual was supported to be themselves, in all of their intersectional identities and quirky glory...a group that was built on radical inclusivity and loving community. I wanted a place where youth could work together to make meaningful change,

and be trained and supported with the tools to do so. And I wanted a place where young Jews could feel proud about who they were, and to learn about all the ways that Judaism and social justice intersect.

From the beginning, youth have been at the center of creating and leading JYCA. Twenty-five years later, JYCA remains a youth-led program dedicated to the same founding principles. Jewish youth live at the center of JYCA and so the organization is vibrant, alive, powerful and innovative.

JYCA was founded out of the need for young progressive Jews to find their collective voice of resistance, cultivate their passion and commitment to social justice, and make concrete changes in their communities as well as in the world. Whatever age you are, and whatever your relationship to JYCA, I want to personally thank you for helping

to sustain and grow JYCA into the amazing program it is today. Together, we can keep JYCA strong and healthy for another 25!

For 25 years, we have been learning by doing. IYCA has been involved in 60+ campaigns and trained hundreds of youth on key organizing skills. Whether fighting against criminalization, showing solidarity with other communities impacted by descrimination, or coorganizing climate work, our belief that lews must be connected with other communities working for change has remained constant. And we've learned a lot about youth organizing along the way. Our approach to leadership development, campaigns and political organizing continues to evolve as we think more about the specific role of lewish youth in our movements.

- Raising over \$10,000 to bail people out of detention and advocating for release of those incarcerated

Whether meeting in parks, on zoom, or at protests at six in the morning, youth design our programs and actions in ways that work for them! Youth are empowered to make choices but not expected to be adults.

Early on we figured out that a close community where youth belong is key to enacting change on the personal, communal, or societal level. All of our work starts with creating a culture of radical inclusivity, identity development, and care. From this place of safety and belonging we provide the training and support youth need to be successful, equipping them with skills to listen, learn, organize and facilitate.

For much of our history we saw skills development and political education as the most important aspects of our work. However over the past 5 years youth have organized within JYCA! We know that political education and mobilizing

for other campaigns is not enough and we've been making changes. We've created affinity spaces to further our culture of belonging, added more analysis about antisemitism and piloted new ways to choose and lead campaigns.



JYCA consists of three programs for youth aged 14-18 in the California Bay Area

JEWS AGAINST MARGINALIZATION (JAM)

JAM is JYCA's affinity space for youth who identify as People of Color, mixed-race, Sephardic or Mizrahi. Through JAM, participants connect with others who share their experiences, learn about intersectional identity formation, develop political power as JOCSM youth, lead on select JYCA campaigns, and host community-building events.

THE LEADERSHIP GROUP IN TRAINING (LGiT)

LGiT is JYCA's introductory, 6-month biweekly program. Youth in LGiT participate in a series of popular education workshops created and led by their peers to learn about Jewishness, social justice, power, and oppression. THE ORGANIZING GROUP (OG)
OG is an intensive year-long program that supports youth to develop their leadership through our innovative committee structure. Youth choose what committee they want to be on based on what leadership skills they want to hone. Through committees, youth can grow their facilitation skills, participate as full voting members on our board of directors, practice organizing skills on our action committee, or learn how to hold IYCA's cultural work.

Through the current configuration, JYCA's held onto the original vision of the organization as a space for Jewish teens to learn about the world, practice leadership skills and build a radically inclusive community.








WHERE ARE WE GOING NEXT?

To move toward our vision we're developing a new purpose statement, strategy, and plan for how we'll strengthen our work while holding on to our magic. We've engaged youth, alumni, community partners and former staff in a stakeholder process to create guiding priorities for the future of our organization.

CONTINUING JYCA'S IMPACT

WE WILL DEEPEN OUR ORGANIZING WORK

We want to leverage our unique power as Jewish youth on the issues where we can make a difference. To move from a model where youth mobilize as allies in adult campaigns to a model where JYCA youth fight for and win structural change as progressive Jewish youth, we need to shift our programming and our actions. We plan to do this by:

- Prioritizing campaigns and coalitions that systemically shift power
- Creating an organizing model that connects Jewish youth with other oppressed communities while holding a clear analysis of antisemitism and racial justice
- Shifting our curriculum to teach base-building skills in addition to the socio-political education which has been our focus

WE WILL CENTER RACIAL JUSTICE IN OUR ORGANIZATION AND OUR WORK

At JYCA we're committed to creating a community where youth see all of their intersecting identities, experiences and full selves represented. In order to do that, we commit to centering racial justice in all aspects of JYCA. Here are some of the ways we're doing this work:

- Articulating JYCA's vision of antiracist, anti-oppressive culture through a 6-month collective process
- Revamping our organizational policies to center racial justice and equity
- Dedicating a full program model for Jews Against Marginalization (JAM), our program for Jewish youth of color, mixed-race, Sephardi and Mizrahi youth

WE WILL CULTIVATE JYCA'S MAGIC

Youth keep coming back to our programs for the "JYCA magic"— the deep connections youth build with one another and the indescribable feeling of being part of a community where, as one youth put it, there is "freedom to be ourselves." We will maintain this essential part of JYCA's work by:

- Training staff on mental health first aid in order to support our youth on retreats and throughout the year
- Providing more peer-to-peer counseling workshops for youth so youth have skills to support each other
- Empowering our culture committee to ensure that we center youth empowerment, radical inclusivity, and vulnerability in everything we do

JYCA has survived for 25 years on the love and labor of our community. At JYCA, we don't believe in growth for the sake of growth. Our growth is strategic, youth-led and necessary to serve our purpose and fulfill our vision. We've worked with youth and our entire community to define our own vision of success and we know sustainable financial growth must be included in our strategic plan.

With \$36,000 we can secure accessible, centrally-located youth meeting and office spaces

We know youth don't all have the same ability to get around the Bay Area. Youth in the Peninsula have shared transportation and traffic as one of the biggest barriers to participation.

"JAM has allowed me to find a community and family that I will be grateful for forever- It empowered me to reclaim space in Judaism that I've felt disconnected from for so long."



With \$108,000 we can seed a new staff position and hire JYCA's first ever Director of Organizing
