

Sogetsu Ikebana

Prior to the 1920s, practicing Ikebana or Japanese flower arrangement meant following traditional, established forms, refined over hundreds of years.

The practice can be traced back to the sixth century when Buddhism was introduced to Japan. The first classical styles of Ikebana started in the middle of the fifteenth century following ancient Zen disciplines and aimed at achieving perfect harmony, beauty, and balance. In 1927 Sofu Teshigahara revolutionised Ikebana. Founding the Sogetsu school, he encouraged artists to explore 'free style'.

Teshigahara established Sogetsu Ikebana as a sculptural art designed to create dynamic, three-dimensional forms composed not only of flower and plant material arranged in a container, but also various materials such as broken egg shells, tin cans, cardboard boxes, wire and rope. He encouraged practitioners to work with nature in an individual and imaginative way using colour, line and texture. The school promoted an Ikebana with no limits, in which materials of any type could be displayed in any circumstance, enhancing and transcending the qualities of nature.

This work contrasts the brutal, rustic beauty of broken clay bricks with the freshness of living plant materials and vibrant tropical flowers.






