Blue boy, Curmudgeon, Living Skin, and Service launch **Nine** in Chinatown, NY, with Inaugural Collaborative Exhibition *Group Shower*, Opening October 10, 2025.

FOR IMMEDIATE RELEASE—New York, NY—September 25, 2025—Nine, a new curatorial partnership and art space in Manhattan's Chinatown / Two Bridges area, is pleased to announce its public opening with an inaugural exhibition, Group Shower, opening October 10, 2025. The exhibition is collaboratively curated by blue boy, Curmudgeon, Living Skin, and Service—the four partners anchoring the new space.

Located at the basement of 9 Monroe St, the space brings together artist-run and alternatively driven projects in a shared home for experimentation, gathering, and collective imagination. Established through a network of peers sourced by Living Skin to push the narrative of alternative spaces, Nine houses rotating exhibitions, public programs, and community-centered activations. The four coresident initiatives each hold distinct and independent approaches, while intersecting around values of care, attention, and transformation.

The curatorial partnership is dedicated to advancing critical dialogue around alternative curatorial and artistic practices, foregrounding experimentation as a vital force within contemporary art by supporting underrepresented perspectives, fostering interdisciplinary exchange, and connecting regional and metropolitan contexts. Nine functions as both a site of artistic experimentation and a hub for public engagement.

The show unfolds the partners' independent histories and continuing directions into one collective installation, introducing the partnership to the public. Group Shower features works by Chris Baker, Janos Cseh, Tristan Higginbotham, Seung-Jun Lee, Martin Miller, Scott Richter, MC Sparks, and James Warren.



A grand opening celebration and opening reception of *Group Shower* will take place on the evening of Friday, October 10, 2025, marking both the launch of the space and the beginning of an ongoing program of exhibitions, happenings, performances, and gatherings.

## Curmudgeon Directed by Jordan Segal

Curmudgeon is an independent curatorial project run by artist Jordan Segal. It began as an apartment gallery with a pop-up show co-curated with Rachel Yanku of Art Show Projects. It is now expanding into a collective space at Nine. Curmudgeon is passionate about materially expressive work and does not shy away from art that challenges the viewer. The project's ambition is to present work that might not otherwise have the opportunity to be shown in a traditional gallery setting. Curmudgeon's programming primarily consists of group exhibitions, with a strong emphasis on developing thematic shows that foster dialogue and community building. The project plans to host selective solo exhibitions, allowing individual artists to fully utilize the space. In addition to exhibitions, Curmudgeon will host artist talks, workshops, and readings—offering multiple avenues for artists to share their ideas and contribute to a vibrant community.

#### Artists on view

Christopher Baker is a New York City based multidisciplinary artist. Growing up in Newport, Rhode Island he fostered a deep interest in the coastal environment which remains a critical component of his practice. After graduating from the Rhode Island School of Design with a BFA in illustration in 1990 he worked in Los Angeles building sets, models and props for film and television. This tenure expanded the skillset that informs his current work. Relocating to New York City in 2001, Baker was captivated by the metropolitan coastline which he continues to explore and research while gathering materials along the way.


Janos Cseh (b.1993) is an artist living and working in Brooklyn, New York. His work addresses the relationship between spatial perception, presence, and collective memory. Channeling 1800's panorama painting, projected environments, IMAX theater, and phone screens, the painting surface acts as a reflection and critique of the consumerization of the immersive experience. In opposition to the digital capitalization of our attention, paintings offer an anti-ephemeral space to unpack the way societal, visual, and algorithmic systems are filters for human connection. **Tristan Higginbotham** (b. 1996) is an artist from Nashville, her Tennessee Mountain Home. After receiving her BFA from Watkins College of Art in 2018, she moved to NYC, where she maintains a studio practice in Queens and works as a state-licensed wildlife rehabilitator and veterinary assistant. She has participated in various residencies, such as the NYC Audubon Governors Island residency (2019), Stoveworks (Chattanooga, TN, 2021), Byrdcliffe Artist Colony (Woodstock, NY, 2022), and Wave Hill AIR (Bronx, NY, 2023). 

transition using hormone replacement therapy. A path with no real end, the paintings are only dictated by a small progrogression of marks that slowly accumulate to a final image. The work attempts to be the visual reflection of small unseen changes that happen quietly within the body. They do this all through the lens of their southern upbringing and their ever changing idea of what it means to be trans and masculine.



**Scott Richter** was born in Atlanta, GA in 1943. He attended Parsons School of Design in the early 1960s to study industrial design. The Museum of Modern Art was a few blocks away and so begun his flirtation with the art world. A technical master uncomfortable with his comfort zone, his work often blends representation and abstraction, refinement and chaos. While his career has been marked by distinct chapters, there's a raw emotionality, dark subtext, and hint of humor that carries throughout his work.

**MC Sparks** (b. 1995, Macon, GA) lives and works in Brooklyn, NY. They received a BFA in Painting from the University of Georgia in 2019. Their paintings are an exploration into the routines that make up their everyday life. Through a process of layering using color, pattern, figure, and shapes they approach the canvas just as they do with their
