Reading and Presentation Groups

In addition, you will be responsible for participation in one group paper and presentation based upon a book choice. There will be several books available. The group size will be limited to no more than three, and it will be first come first serve for membership in each group.

Warning: If you do not pull your weight in a group, or if your presence is a hindrance to the others, your group mates may expel you from the group. Expulsion must be done within the first month. Before it can proceed, the group must have a conference with the instructor who will try to mediate and correct the problems. If the problem persists, then the expulsion will proceed. You will still be responsible for the presentation of materials. You may try to join another group; if you are unable to join another group, then you will be assigned another text or you will proceed to complete the same text on your own. Removal from the group may be due to lack of participation, but other reasons may lead to separation from a group. Separation should not be considered a negative sign.

WARNINGS SPECIFIC TO THIS CLASS

During the course of the semester, we will be discussing topics that some people may find uncomfortable. We will have explicit discussions about animal and human sexual behaviour and anatomy. We will discuss spiteful behaviours across species, including genocides and war. We will talk about coerced sexual intercourse across species. And we will discuss gender-specific behaviours across species. Please see the weekly course topics and the book selections for the complete list.

Each of the ten quizzes is worth 11 points with the opportunity to earn bonus points. Only the top nine quizzes will be used to calculate your score. (I know it only adds up to 99 points, but this "missing" point will be more than accounted for through the bonus questions.)

Because of the Corona virus outbreak the remaining part of the semester will be on line. Each meeting will have its own security password. The remaining quizzes will be on line and timed. You will have a week to do them. You are responsible for looking through the PowerPoints before class. We will discuss the principles in the reviews and then go over the PowerPoints with that information in mind.

Book Report and Presentation: 100 points (70 for paper and 30 for presentation) The paper will be graded upon both form and content. 50% of your grade is based upon the grammar and structure of the paper. The other 50% looks at the analysis and summary of the content. You will lose points for unnecessary fluff and repetitions. You have three-four pages double spaced, 1" margins in Times New Roman or Calibre to make your points. Speak with a single voice, and DO NOT repeat the same materials! Pull what is unique from each section and then summarize the materials to tell your story. All papers should conform to APA style.

Estimated Total Point Score: 550 points.

Final Percentage Grade: $90\% + = A \quad 80\% + = B \quad 70\% + = C \quad 60\% + = D \quad < 60\% = F$ I keep all tests and assignments and I do not use class time to review the results. With remote teaching and the scheduling troubles some people will have with covid, reviewing the quizzes and exams is virtually impossible in class. You are, however, welcome to come and review exams with me. This offer is particularly important if you are not doing well in the class.

Final Exam: To be done on D2L by the day set by the school!

Exam and Quiz Formats:

Lecture exams: Lecture exams will consist of multiple-choice questions.

I have done my best to avoid having exams fall on major religious holidays. If an exam appears to fall on a holiday for your faith, please let me know at the beginning of the semester (first week), or I will be unable to reschedule the exam. Conflicts with the final exam and a religious holiday must be dealt with on an individual basis. UNLESS NOTIFIED DURING THE FIRST WEEK, I CANNOT RESCHEDULE A PRACTICAL LABORATORY EXAM.

•MAKE UP POLICY: Everyone gets to make up one **quiz** without an excuse. A second missed quiz must have a verifiable excuse. There will be NO make-ups for missed exams other than for extreme emergencies.

OTHER STUFF

1. If you are in the honours section, additional criteria will apply.

2. There is no OFFICIAL policy of required attendance. but I will take attendance regularly during the first three weeks, and randomly after the first three weeks. However, it is unlikely that you will earn an acceptable grade if you do not attend class regularly, because my lectures are key components of the exams. Attendance alone does not guarantee a passing grade. Attendance will be considered in the final grade, especially in borderline cases.

3. It is important that you take complete and comprehensive notes of the materials.

4. It is also *essential that you study regularly*. The material in this class does not lend itself to cramming. Learning systematics is like learning the violin. It takes repeated sessions of practice.

5. Expect to spend 4-8 hours per week studying the materials on your own.

6. After each lecture, you should reread and/or rewrite your notes and read the material in the websites again to make sure that you correctly took the notes and fully understand the material that was covered. Rewriting the material longhand is a far more effective memory tool than typing into a computer. Try using two columns, the first listing broad concepts, and the second containing a list of facts and supportive evidence linked to that concept.

7. Look over the study guides prior to class whenever possible. Then use the study guide to organize your notes after class. The sooner you reinforce material, the more likely it is to stick. Prior to the exam, use the study guide to re-assess whether you have learned the material, but do not depend on this guide as quick way to cram. We may be ahead or behind during any given week. You need to work with me, letting me know when you are having trouble comprehending a section.

Study Tip:

As you learn about behaviours, look for the commonalities among clades of organisms. Impose the particulars (when you can find them) upon the background. Keep in mind that behaviour is an adaption, just like anatomy and physiology.

And remember the key: successful reproduction to keep the genes that support a behaviour in the gene pool. *Think of the chicken as the egg's way of making another egg, and they you've got it!*
