WHY THIS DOC?

Nashville, like a lot of mid-sized American cities, is being gentrified and developed out of its character and culture.

But it's not all shit news.

There are people who are putting sweat and tears into maintaining what has been and what will be of the other side of Nashville culture. Sure, the city is benefiting from the bachelorettes and the honky-tonkers, but it's the makers and the small business owners that are continuously developing the community and economy as a whole.

We know it gets all jargony to say that mixed use manufacturing infrastructure is going to sustain and grow a city's economy over a span of 20 or 30 years. It's difficult to put to paper why a space pieced together by weird art kids for the sheer purpose of creating and empowering others to do the same is so important.

It's easier to just show it. That's what Fort Houston did so well.




They threw parties and **invited** people into the space.

ARTISTIC APPROACH

The magic of this film will be in its duality. Then and now. Archival and present.

By intertwining a huge library of archival footage and authentic verite style interviews with the characters in their spaces now, a narrative of trailblazers, iconoclasts and entrepreneurs will emerge from the paint stained clothes of artists, craftsmen, and hangers on.

Wide, photographic shots and close up, gritty, seemingly self-filmed scenes will transport us to a Nashville long lost. Wistful monologues about why the space was so magical and intimate will commingle with the artists at work now. It will show that while the Fort Houston era of Nashville may be gone, its legacy is not.





WHO WE ARE


