

what do ICE officers / cars look like?

ICE officers...

- wear neck gaiters covering the bottom half of their face
- often wearing tactical vests marked with DHS or Police/ICE, sometimes plain clothes
- jeans, tactical pants
- California requires a clearly marked badge number
- travel in pairs, minimum



ICE cars...

- often unmarked! white, gray, black
- Fords, Dodges, Chevy's
- rolled up in unmarked mini van to the courts

there's more to do!

Share food & resources: Cook a meal or bring water and snacks to the courts! Speak Spanish? Help translate!

Keep each other safe: Wearing all black, a mask, or non-descript clothes to the protests outside the courts makes it harder for anyone to be identified, keeping everyone safer.

Organize a community presence on

Wednesday or Thursday:

Are you part of a labor organization, a faith group, a political org, or a network of people who are down to protect your communities? Reach out to them and plan to show up together with snacks, water, and a plan to hang out for the day.

tips on reporting ICE agents in your neighborhood

Spread information, not panic! When reporting potential threats, share as much information as possible. SALUTE is a handy acronym!

Size/strength: 5-6 officers, one unmarked car and a mini van

Actions/activity: Harassing people on the street, knocking on a neighbor's door, in the car

Location/direction: Heading west up Market street between Powell and Montgomery

Uniform/Clothes: Blue jeans, tactical vests, covered faces

Time/date: Wednesday July 23, 9:45 am

Equipment/weapons: Batons, vests, rifle

we keep us safe



Check in with YOUR neighbors! Make plans in case you see ICE in your neighborhood. We keep each other safe.

ICE has shown us they will resort to violence to carry out their abductions, attacking protestors who put their own bodies between ICE and their targets. Keep this in mind, but you don't have to put yourself in harm's way to show up for your neighbors. The more people who come out to defend immigrants at the courts, the safer it is for everyone. There's a whole spectrum of ways to support this effort!

8am-4:30pm. Gather your friends, your faith groups, your orgs, and come out!

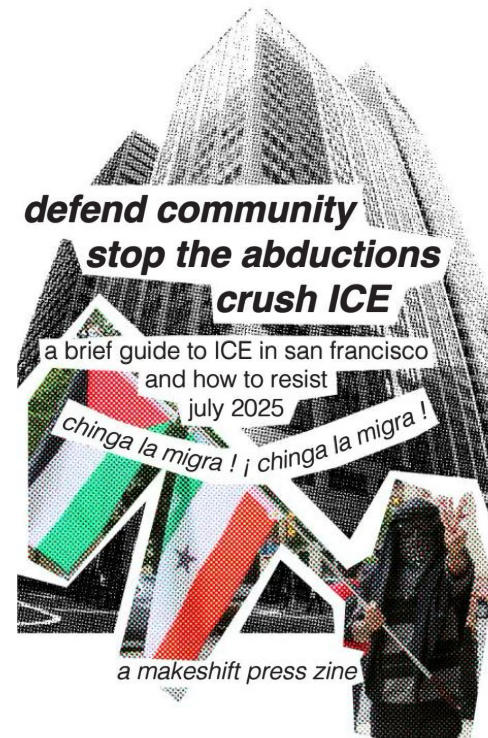

ICE out of San Francisco

As of mid-July, US Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) officers have abducted ~40 immigrants from their regularly scheduled court appearances or check-ins at the ICE office. Immigrants come to the courthouse in full cooperation with the law and are detained on the spot, separated from their families and sent across the country to detention centers where they are held indefinitely in brutal conditions with no due process.

The US has rapidly built internment camps for detained immigrants, including children and migrants who have legal residency documents. ICE's budget was just increased 10x-- the 12th biggest military budget in the world, waging war against our neighbors and communities.
