

Public Restrooms in the U.S.

- 8 restrooms per 100,000
- Many public restrooms were closed due to concerns about crime, vandalism, and maintenance costs, particularly in the 1960s and 70s
- Culture in the U.S. in very individualistic: we don't like to take care of things that don't belong to us!
- Other countries often charge money for public restrooms, but they are clean and safe


Why Does this Matter?
