Personal Artwork Projects

1.1 Series of <The Forest on the Borderline>

This series captures beings poised between nature and civilization, the real and the surreal, peace and uncertainty. Set in snowy forests, each scene blends animals and human figures to reflect what I call the "mood of the borderline": peaceful yet anxious, protected yet fragile. These paintings reflect our emotional climate between calm and quiet unease.

In a forest stripped of leaves, a woman sits alone on snow-covered ground, surrounded by bears. The moment feels both safe and tense. This piece explores the boundary between humanity and the wild - the breath that exists within stillness.

A child and woodland animals share a warm, fairytale-like moment. Yet the trees are cut, and the snow remains unmelted. The scene gently conveys the coexistence of new beginnings and quiet loss.



This piece explores the theme of memory through the imagery of the sea. The zebra, a naturally migratory animal, and the sea with its endless ebb and flow, both evoke a sense of movement. Yet in this scene, both the zebra and the woman remain still, suspended in time. Surrounded by fragments of the past, they are unable to move forward. Through this painting, I reflect on the identity of the modern individual, adrift and submerged in memory.






This piece speaks to a state of "stillness" between dream and reality. The zebras appear as though they are meant to journey somewhere, yet they remain unable to move. The snow has erased all traces, and they simply stand in silence. Through this scene, I wanted to evoke the distance between us and the image of an ideal world or salvation, how we linger just short of reaching it. This snowy field, though unreal, quietly mirrors the deepest landscapes of our inner world.

1.2 The Story of Animals


These artworks consist of various works centered around animals, exploring messages about life through their relationships with their surroundings and people. Some pieces are simply commissioned portraits of pets, particularly dogs and cats, created at the request of clients, while others use animals as a medium to convey deeper meanings, expressing human emotions and the depth of life.

A white bear rests in an arctic dreamscape. The scene is cozy yet eerie where the line between comfort and survival blurs, exposing our vulnerability.





1.3 Series of <What the Corners Remember>

This series explores the fragile balance between comfort and discomfort through surreal interiors composed of discarded, forgotten, and broken elements. These rooms are not pristine or perfect, but assembled from emotional residue, spaces that embrace imperfection and reflect the vulnerability I perceive in all things. I'm drawn to the edges of experience: overlooked objects, abandoned corners, and traces of life left behind. While each scene may feel unstable or uncanny, I reframe them with a touch of whimsy, creating intimate spaces where unease and playfulness coexist.

1.4 Series of <Peripheral Reveries>

This series is a visual meditation on the overlooked and the unremembered - the corners of consciousness where forgotten objects and fragmented spaces quietly persist. Through surreal abstractions that echo ruins, residues, and ambiguous architectures, it explores the soft boundaries between memory and materiality. The forms, suspended between decay and regeneration, invite the viewer to linger in liminal zones, the margins where meaning is often abandoned or yet to emerge. Rendered in muted hues and fluid contours, the work gestures toward a landscape of the subconscious, where the peripheral becomes central, and what is usually ignored begins to speak.

2.1 Overview









2.2 Promotional Assets



































Promotional assets for 'Special class' such as pet portrait drawing and acrylic mini painting, as well as regular courses like beginner painting












2.3 Sample Artworks for Class


