# Thesis Statement

From a young age, I've always been captivated by visual storytelling. Film, television, and online videos became the lens through which I interpreted the world. Stories offer me the unique opportunity to experience perspectives beyond my own and I constantly seek out others who shared that same sense of connection. I find that my fascination with these stories ultimately define my identity not only as an individual, but as a designer. In *Press Play*, I investigate how design can be used to create spaces for sharing passions and foster human connection through collective storytelling.

*Press Play* explores how design, particularly through motion and video, can serve as a tool to cultivate conversation. "Press" is representative of the journalistic coverage I collect and "play" refers to my reinterpretations and recontextualization of the content. By creating time-based narratives, motion allows me to reinterpret for the screen in engaging ways. Through interviewing and collecting stories from others, I weave personal accounts into my work to develop collaborative narratives. I examine how design can be curated to create spaces where individuals can indirectly converse with others through shared passions. In a digital age that often prioritizes individuality, I aim to encourage curiosity and the discovery of new perspectives, ultimately unifying an audience through narrative movement.

**Do you have a favorite movie? If you can remember, what was it like watching it for the first time?**

I bounce back and forth between a few, these days I say *Twelve Angry Men* (1957) or *Nine Days* (2020). I first saw *Twelve Angry Men* as a play at a local theater when I was 12 and I was blown away by the story, it was so simple yet so complex. When I learned there was a film I of course had to see it, unbeknownst to me it's widely regarded as one of the best films of all time. I distinctly remember watching it with a friend at his house for a sleepover. Two 12 year old boys absolutely entranced by this black and white 1957 legal drama.

*Nine Days* is a different story. I knew almost nothing about the film going into it, watching it on my laptop in bed through a screening link I bought from the Hamptons International Film Festival. I had decided on it because the general description sounded interesting and I liked the stars Winston Duke, Zazie Beetz, and Benedict Wong. I was woefully unprepared for how the film would impact me. It was a confusing time in my life, and this beautiful story about how precious life is and what we have to do with the time we get shook me to my core. It would be months before I'd get to watch the film again, and luckily I loved it just the same. I told everyone I knew about it, hoping others could see the beauty in it that I did. It never really took off and didn't leave a cultural impact but it's something I think about on a daily basis and I think that's pretty priceless.

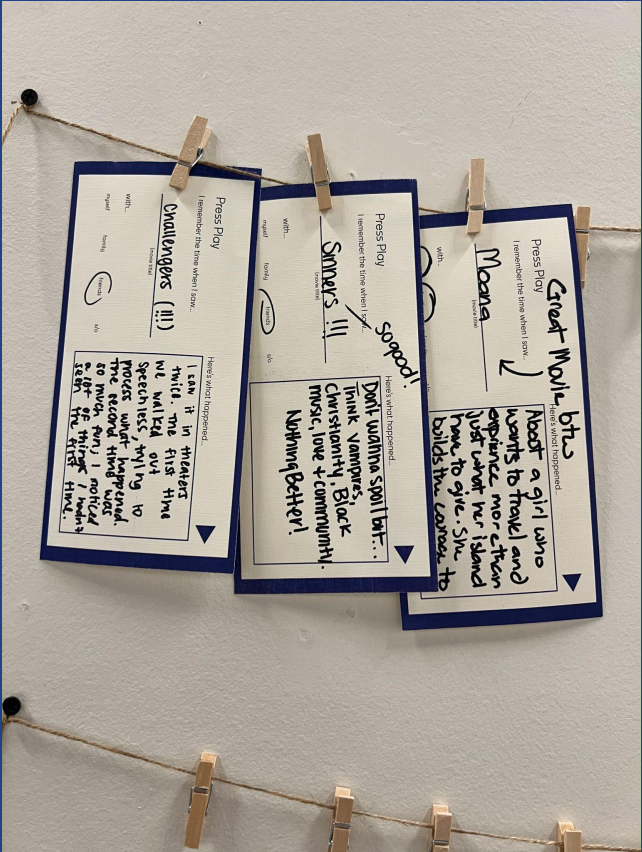

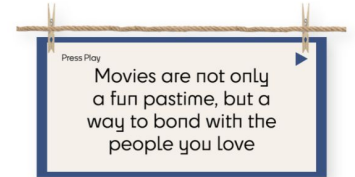
